

The Year 11 Prom will be taking place on 9th May 2013 at the Lake at Barston, West Midland Golf Club. Attendance Matters



Are you Safe Online?

On Safer Internet day the whole school completed an Internet and Technology use survey.

We found out that a whopping 97% of you have your own mobile phone and 98% of you have access to a computer! This is brilliant news as the internet has opened up huge opportunities for creativity and innovation and now that Frog (the new VLE) has arrived it will be even more useful for helping you continue your studies at home. However, with any new technology, we must make sure that we are using it safely.

On these pages there are hints and tips to make sure that you stay safe and use new technology responsibly.

Using Social Networking Sites

Over 75% of you have a Facebook account and many of you are also on other social networking site. These can be great fun but remember these key messages;

Be careful what information you give out on your profile. Remember that you don't know who your friend's friends are... or your friend's friends' friends! And you don't know what they'll do with your picture or your phone number if you give it out by mistake. Once your picture is out there, it's out there forever and you won't be able to get it back.

Be aware that information on your profile could potentially be viewed by anyone. So if you wouldn't be comfortable printing it off and handing it out on the street, maybe it shouldn't be on your profile.

Use a nickname or your initials instead of your name - you don't want just anyone knowing who you are. Consider changing your photo to a cool graphic or picture of your favourite band, that way strangers won't have access to a picture of you. It's not a great idea to post where you're going on your profile or twitter or where you live. Think through if you'd want everyone who can view the post to turn up at any time!

Privacy Settings

Use your Privacy Settings. Adjust your account settings (sometimes called "Privacy Settings") so only approved friends can instant message you. This won't ruin your social life - new people can still send you friend requests and message you, they just won't be able to pester you via IM. This means that people you don't want to see your profile can't! post to turn up at any time!

Uploading Photos

Only upload pictures that you'd be happy for your mum to see - anything that you would want passed round the dinner table should NOT make it onto the web, as you don't know who could be looking at it or what they might be doing with it. Don't post your phone number or email address on your homepage. Think about it why would anyone actually need this info when they can message you privately via your social networking site?

Don't post pictures of you or your mates wearing school uniform - if dodgy people see your school badge, they can work out where you are and find you. The more anonymous you are, the less vulnerable you are to people with bad intentions. Tick the "no pic forwarding" option on your settings page - this will stop people forwarding your pictures to anyone without

Using Chat Rooms

Almost half of you use online chat rooms.

Things to remember...

It's very easy for people to lie about who they are, even if you've been chatting to the same person for ages and you feel like you know them, remember it's very easy to lie on the internet and there is no way of knowing if someone is telling the truth. Even if someone shows you a photo of themselves, this could be a picture of someone else or could be faked. This applies to webcam or video footage too; seeing a person in a video, does not mean it's them.

Sharing personal information

Be careful not to share too much information with other people in chat rooms. You don't know who could be listening in or what they might do with that information. If you wouldn't be comfortable yelling it out in a crowded room, its best not to write it in a chat room.

There are some adults who will try to get in touch with young people and children because they have bad intentions. Bear this in mind whilst you use chat areas. If anything makes you suspicious tell an adult you trust or report any serious concerns to us using ClickCEOP.

Blocking people

Make sure you know how to block Instant Messaging contacts. They will not be told you have blocked them; you will just appear offline in their contacts list, so they cannot message you. Don't forget you can always delete a contact if you don't wish to talk to them anymore.

On Windows Live Messenger you can block a user by right clicking on their icon in your contacts list and choosing 'block'.

Saving Evidence

It's also a good idea to learn how to save conversations. This way, if anything weird or dodgy happens, you have evidence of it and you can show it to an adult you trust or copy and paste it into our reporting form.

If you think someone has hacked into your account - report it to the people who run the site.

Cyber **Bullying**













By using technology like mobiles or the internet, this type of bullying can affect someone not just at school, but at home as well. Because it takes place in the virtual world, it has a 24/7 nature and can make someone feel upset or threatened in their own home.

It can sometimes be hard to identify who the cyberbully is because they could block their number or post things on a website anonymously. The nature of this type of bullying means it can have a large audience, many of whom may not even realise they are being bullies.

A positive thing about this kind of bullying is that it can be evidenced. With normal bullying, it can be one person's word against another's, but with cyberbullying you can save texts or print our emails / IM's / WebPages. This can be used as proof to catch the bully and stop them upsetting someone; this could be you or a friend.

What should you do if you are being Cyber Bullied?

Save all evidence you have of the bullying. If you have nasty emails or things posted on your profile save them to your machine so you can use it as proof. Save texts or voicemails that say anything horrible. Learn how to **block the bully** on IM or delete them from your contacts.

Try not to reply or retaliate to things they say or do; it might make the situation worse. If you don't respond, they are more likely to get bored and move on. Make sure that you report it to a trusted adult.

CEOP

CEOP are The Child Exploitation and Online **Protection** (CEOP) Centre if anyone ever makes you feel weird or uncomfortable online they are the people that you can report it to. If you visit their website http://www.ceop.police.uk/safety-centre/ you will find information that can help you as well as a button that you can report what has happened. Look for this button!


Cinema Trip - Amour

iFeliz Pascua!

Spain is well-known for Holy Week ceremonies that are held between Palm Sunday and Good Friday.

Parades include floats of Christ or the Virgin Mary.

Approximately 60 people hold each float on their shoulders. During the parades, matching hooded robes are worn.

Easter Week is called Semana Santa in Spain. The week begins on Domingo de Ramos (Palm Sunday) and ends with Lunes de Pascua (Easter Monday). On Domingo de Ramos, people attend mass in the morning. Children take palm branches to be blessed. Most churches have parades to represent Jesus arriving in Jerusalem.

The Easter day feast is special. Godfathers present a cake known as la Mona to their godchild. The cakes can be normal round shaped or almost anything, such as Disney characters or toys. Also special is the torrijas, slices of warm bread soaked in milk, sugar and egg and fried in olive oil, served with syrup, honey, sugar, cinnamon and wine.


Joyeuses Pâques!

The majority of the population of France is Roman Catholic, so many people attend special church services on Easter. Church bells stop ringing on Good Friday to commemorate Jesus' death and ring out again on Easter Sunday in recognition of his resurrection. When the bells stop ringing on Good Friday, children are told that they have gone to Rome to see the Pope and when the chimes return, they will bring the eggs with them.

The night before Easter Sunday children prepare nests in their gardens and houses and then on Easter Sunday children look for their eggs, this egg hunt is called la chasse aux œufs.

There is a traditional game on Easter Sunday. Children throw raw eggs up in the air and catch them. They keep doing this until someone drops one.

April Fool's Day, on 1st April, occurs around the time of Easter. In France, the tradition is that children play a trick on as many adults as possible by sticking paper fish onto their backs and running away. They shout 'poisson d'avril!' - meaning 'April fish!'





'Les Misérables' trip

On Tuesday 5th February, the Creative Arts and Modern Foreign Languages faculties combined to take 100 students to watch the current chart hit film 'Les Misérables' at The Regal Cinema in Evesham.

'Les Misérables' has smashed box office records, racked up an impressive eight Oscar nominations, and taken home the coveted 'Best Actor' and 'Best Supporting Actress' awards at the Golden Globes. Its impressive cast, including Russell Crowe, Anne Hathaway, Hugh Jackman and Amanda Siefried are wowing audiences everywhere with the new screen adaptation of the much loved musical, based on the French novel by Victor Hugo.



With a welcome 4 course meal inside, we could all start dreaming of the white slopes that awaited us for the rest of the week.

At nearly 2000m above sea level it was a great place to really appreciate the stunning views that are the Dolomite Mountains.

It wasn't long before we were soon into action. The group of 43 split into 3 groups - experienced skiers, intermediates and beginners. Everyone soon got into the swing of things and huge progress was seen almost immediately in all groups as red slopes and blue slopes were experienced by all on the first day. Year 7 followed on from their lesson on the Sichuan Earthquake in China by designing a refugee camp out of play dough to meet the needs of all the people left homeless by the earthquake.



As part of their Geography module in Humanities year 9 are carrying out a fieldwork investigation so they are prepared for the real thing at GCSE. At the end of January, 9B2 and 9B1 went over to Solihull town centre to investigate how shopping in the town had changed.

They asked over 60 shoppers their views on shopping in Solihull and whether they felt the Touchwood development had improved shopping in the area. They also took photos, carried out environmental quality surveys and land use surveys to compare with 1999 data before Touchwood was built. The Coppice Primary School expands to three form entry, meeting the needs of our community



We have responded to the needs of our community by starting an expansion process. Because of our high standards we were able to access funding for this; the government is eager to support schools whose SATs results reflect this. This year we had many applications for places, and could not have met this demand without this expansion.

Also, the demand for places will increase as the new housing in the area is built.

The Coppice Primary School has historically had two classes within each

year group. This will change from September 2013 with our first ever intake of three classes in our Reception year group. This will continue year on year until we fill up to a full three form entry school in 2020. Accordingly, this

change will be very gradual (over seven years), allowing us plenty of time to appoint quality teachers and resource the new classes. The Coppice has a wonderful ethos that we are very precious about; we believe that this gradual transition will enable us to preserve this ethos. The design and layout of the new buildings will allow us to manage infants and juniors separately, ensuring that we still have a smaller school feel about us but still retaining the same leadership, shared vision and ethos throughout the school.

Our SATs results over the last three years have been record breaking, with The Coppice appearing in the national press. However, we do not purely focus on academic excellence, having gained top national awards for the arts (Artsmark Gold), sports (Activemark Gold), Eco Schools (Green Flag status), and we also have Healthy Schools Award as well as our second Quality Mark Award which recognises that our provision for Teaching and Learning is of a high standard. As well as this we are the leading primary school for

gymnastics in the whole of the West Midlands, winning competitions year on year, going on to represent the West Midlands in national finals at Stoke-on Trent, where we have been national champions. In September we had an Ofsted inspection resulting in a good report with some outstanding features.

Being immediate neighbours of Woodrush High school, understandably, we have close links with them and good transition processes that ensure the move to high school is as smooth as it can possibly be for our children. Accordingly, every one of our children is guaranteed a place at Woodrush High School.

We are very excited by our new build which will give us seven brand new, fully equipped, state of the art classrooms as well as an extra hall. Effectively creating an infant block (see picture above).

"Say yes" said Droovil...






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Our year 7 book club generated a real excitement for books and reading by organising a successful book fair in the week running up

After testing the soil for its pH, texture and porosity they then moved on to

sample lake water. Of particular enjoyment was the macro-invertebrate sampling (pond dipping to most people!). Lauren came out top scorer with her brilliant caddis fly larvae find.

Despite the weather being very cold and fresh, the students did really well and helped to provide valuable information to be used in a Nation wide survey to assess the quality of soils and freshwater across the country. Well done!

achieve even more certificates next year.








Ingredients

1 Normal sized box of shredded wheat (16 large biscuits) 400g milk Chocolate 2 x 100g bags on mini eggs Cake cases

- 1. Crush the Shredded Wheat biscuits into a bowl using your hands or a food mixer
- 2. Break the chocolate into pieces and melt in a microwave on a low heat, stirring every 30 seconds
