

Knife Crime Assemblies

Science

On Mondays afterschool a group of year 7 and 8 students take part in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) club. The club is led by teachers and technicians from maths, science and technology looking at completing challenges across all the subjects. So far students have designed and made their own towers, used Lego to make cars, made flammable snakes, set fire to their teachers and make rainbow coloured fizz.

More recently, the students have completed the BP Ultimate STEM Challenge. Wearable technology is changing our world. From smartwatches that monitor our health to shoes that can change colour to match each outfit, the possibilities are endless. So, this year, the Ultimate STEM Challenge is for

students to come up with amazing ideas for new wearable tech that will improve our lives in the future. There are some brilliant prizes up for grabs; from trips to the BP learning centre to up to £750 for the STEM club. Entries have now been submitted and results will be revealed in January.

They are currently completing a Bronze Crest Award from the British Science Association. Students work independently or in groups to plan and run a project addressing a real-world STEM problem. The topic chose was to how to make a rollercoaster faster. Students will research into the science behind roller-coaster, then design and make their rollercoasters and then look at how they can make it faster.

Agencies like Social Services, charities and their own staff refer families in need and their name, age and gender is logged. GCSE Geography Visits

Back in September all GCSE Geography students spent two days collecting information for the fieldwork element of their Geography Examinations.

The first day was spent on the Long Mynd Hills in Shropshire, collecting river data to see how the stream in Carding Mill Valley changed downstream. This involved measuring the widths and depths of the stream as well as the speed of flow. Whilst there we also focused on how we collected data and how we can mitigate risk in our fieldwork practice.

The second day was spent in Solihull Town Centre where students were looking to see what impact Touchwood has had on the rest of the shopping district. Students spent time looking at the location of different types of shop, asking shoppers their views and also looking and making judgements on the shopping environment.

All students now have the necessary information to work through that aspect of their examination. Hopefully we will see the successes of these trips later in the summer!





STAR Swimmer


Tyler



In October a group of year 7 students went to Worcester Cathedral to meet the author Robin Stevens. When we first arrived Robin gave a talk to an audience of students from many different schools. She explained that she decided to write murder mystery stories because she had enjoyed the genre as a child. She grew up in Pembroke College where her father worked for the University of Oxford. With no other children living in the college, she spent a lot of time spying on adults and reading books. She enjoyed mystery stories because she liked having a puzzle to solve, it was an active way of reading. When she was a bit older and started reading books by Agatha Christie and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle she realised that the solution to the crime could be harder to predict that in the books for younger readers.
