After six years as Headteacher, sadly, this will be my final editorial of 'The Star' but I am delighted to share with you some of the wonderful events and achievements Woodrush has experienced over this last term, following an exceptionally challenging and unprecedented year.

National relaxing of government restrictions, meant that students could experience some normality and they have taken every opportunity we have offered to try new clubs, attend school trips and engage in a tapestry of enrichment events. Since September alone, we have had trips to Kew Gardens, Kenilworth Castle, the Apprenticeships Fair, two theatre trips to watch Matilda and the School of Rock, and a visit to the Hive Library in Worcester.

Our various enrichment clubs such as our Chess, Coding and Art have all run alongside School Productions, Book club and our Science club which has seen students apply investigative skills through rat dissection, forensic, electricity, crystal garden experiments. Following a blanket loss of interschool sporting competitions over the past year, it has been great for Woodrush sports teams to return to winning ways with success being enjoyed in cross country, football and basketball.

Behind the scenes, our unsung heroes in administration, operations and finance have continued to ensure our school building remained open, responsive, safe and well maintained to enable learning and school life to continue and thrive. It has been especially pleasing to complete our necessary heating replacement project. A thank you to all our behind the scenes staff who have kept the school open for business so that learning can happen.

I would like to congratulation our Sixth Formers for their leadership and enterprise which meant we raised £700 through cake sales and hosting a Macmillan coffee morning in September. We also raised £878.90 for Children in Need 2021 through our non-uniform day – so thank you to all who contributed to this important national fundraising effort to support children who are less fortunate and facing difficulties. I have been delighted with how positively our students have engaged in our Anti-Bullying awareness week and contributed to Aspire discussions about bullying. The campaign has rallied a team of Anti-Bullying Student Ambassadors, reinforced our whole school policy, and crucially reminded students about the importance of kindness and respect for all.

Within the community, our flagship adoption of Wythall Train Station funded by West Midland Trains goes from strength to strength. This National Rail adoption scheme has developed from students maintaining flower beds and installing planters to, this term, Year 9 and 10 artists creating nostalgic mural artwork which will be mounted at the station. Both the Wythall Local Parish Council and the West Midlands Railway and London North Western Railway annual conference have praised the efforts of our students. A special thank must be given to Mr Reece and Mrs Martin for their time and commitment in facilitating this fantastic project.

Part of the ongoing success of Woodrush is that we continue to be a popular choice with prospective Year 7 students and their families and carers. Uptake at this year's Open Evening in September was no exception, as we welcomed well over 1000 guests! Visitors were wowed by the activities taking place, commented on the enthusiasm of our staff and praised the friendliness, confidence and pride shown by our 150 students guides and demonstrators.

Christmas is a time of gifting and gratitude for what we have but it is also important for us to remember those less fortunate or facing adversity and crisis in our communities. So ahead of Christmas, as is our Woodrush tradition, we will continue to encourage students to take part in our annual Food Bank drive which will make a small but important difference to local families facing relative poverty this festive season. Thank you to parents, carers and students for your on-going support with our charity work.

Taking stock of all the content of this edition, I cannot thank the staff at Woodrush enough for the way in which they have continued to support our young people and how they have been determined to make sure that our students continue to have enjoyable and enriching experiences. I know that this is only the tip of the iceberg however as, every day in every lesson, students and staff are continuing to achieve wonderful things at Woodrush.

Finally, it has been a privilege to lead such a vibrant school with such enthusiastic and engaging young people, supported and challenged by caring, dedicated staff. Headship in any school is a roller-coaster existence and over 21 years teaching at Woodrush, I have been proud to have worked with many students and staff who have gone on to achieve great things and are a huge credit to the school.

It was a cloudy day (the natural British weather) on a Wednesday. Trees gently swaying in the wind. My father was at work and my mother was cooking me some homemade fish and chips. I was doing my homework as my mother called my name.

"Phillip!" yelled my mother. "Food is ready!"

I replied "Coming!"

I threw my pen on the floor and I ran out my room, straight into the kitchen. My house was an apartment, exceedingly small but it felt like home. As I approached the kitchen the television was on and a troubled look was on my mother's face.

"What's wrong, mother?" I asked. She looked shocked and pale.

Shaking, she replied "...Look at the television, Phillip."

I turned my head to see the news, with footage of increasing water heights. We were warned to move to higher grounds within 4 days. It has been 3 days since then.

My father had earned enough money to buy enough food to survive the flooding. He came back from his job and the business shut down due to flooding and repairs, so he got his final paycheck early. He came rushing home as he heard the terrible news, but also incredibly happy he got paid. We went to the nearest shop and bought everything there was left of that shop. After getting ourself some supplies, my dad's phone buzzed and the latest news announcement was being announced. A man in a tattered suit said "Good evening, citizens. It is unfortunate that I must bring you terrible news. The flooding is getting worse and everyone MUST be up onto higher grounds within 8 hours otherwise... well, you know." and then the announcement cut off.

With only 2 hours left to get everyone and everything to the highest point of the island. People started to call boats to get them to mainland, but of course there was not enough room for everyone, so a few families had to stay behind before more ships arrived. I was one of them. With the island slowly shrinking we all had to make our final resources count.

We managed to get to higher ground and we were all worried for our lives. But for some reason the water stopped climbing higher and instead slightly went down it was really something to witness but little did we know what was about to unfold.

The water was not getting lower because it had ended, no, NO. That was far from reality. As I turned around, a huge tsunami was reaching out to grab me and my family. They never warned us about this. Scared and shocked, I ran towards my parents one last time. I hugged them goodbye and they hugged me goodbye too. I did not think this would be the last time I would ever see them again... In an instant, memories hit me like the tsunami. Memories of me and my parents flooded into my mind. Ironic, isn't it? I savored those last memories as reality came to me. But it was too late for me and my parents.

So that was it. That was the end of me. I was washed away just like my story.

Looking at each other in concern, the two girls were extremely worried. "Uhm, what about getting new ones from the mainland?" Questioned Casey. "Due to the lockdown, we can't so if we can't fix it by the end of the week, we may have to evacuate everyone because of the low supply of water!" the stressed man almost whispered. Polvorones are traditional Spanish Christmas biscuits flavoured with almonds and crumbly in texture.

During the Spanish Inquisition, officials declared that polvorones were to be made with pork fat as a way to detect if there were Muslims or Jews hiding in the regions of Southern Spain. When asked to eat the pork-full biscuits, they had to decline because of their faith and were then taken to face trial. Today, polvorones recipes often replace the pork fat with butter Polvorón' comes from 'polvo', Spanish for dust. Put a whole polvorón in your mouth and then try to say 'Pamplona' very loud and everything will make sense!

Ingredients (makes about 50 small biscuits)

- 500g plain flour
- 250g of unsalted butter at room temperature
- 150g of icing sugar
- 125g ground almonds
- pinch salt
- teaspoon cinnamon (optional but very Christmassy)
- Baking parchment



Method

- Preheat the oven to 180 degrees Celsius
- Sprinkle the flour and ground almonds on a clean and dry baking sheet and toast it in the oven for about four or five minutes
- Remove from the oven and put it into a large mixing bowl
- Turn the oven temperature up to about 220 degrees Celsius
- Add all the other ingredients into the bowl
- Mix and then knead until you have a smooth dough
- Roll out to about 3cm thick and use your favourite cookie cutters to cut out shapes.
- Lay them on the baking parchment on a baking sheet
- Bake for about 5 minutes before placing them on a rack to cool
- You may need to bake them in batches, but at only five minutes' cooking time, that won't matter.
- Once cool, transfer the biscuits to a plate, sprinkle with a little more icing sugar and enjoy!

Guiness World Record - Roscón de Reyes

Roscón de Reyes (kings cake) is a sweet bread eaten on the 6th January which celebrates Epiphany when the Three Kings came to visit the baby Jesus in Bethlehem. The Roscón is decorated with candied fruit to give the appearance of a jewelled crown. A bit like the tradition in the UK of hiding a coin in the Christmas pudding, it is customary to hide either a porcelain figure of one of the Three Kings, or the baby Jesus. Whoever finds it is 'King for the Day' and wears the crown which is normally included with shop-sold cakes.





In Tizimín, Mexico, bakers cooked a 9,874 feet long Roscón de Reyes which set the new world record for the longest line of breads.

More than two tonnes of flour, 10,000 eggs, 350kg of margarine, 16 litres of vanilla, 18 litres of orange blossom water, 25kg of yeast, 150kg of butter and 700kg of sugar went into the very long loaf. In keeping with tradition they also placed 19,000 plastic dolls and another 20 more of clay.



Kew Gardens

This week we had the pleasure of taking our year 13 biologists to Kew Gardens, London along-side the year 9 creative arts students. Kew Gardens features as a case study in A level where they look at conservation of plants, biodiversity and seed banks. The trip enabled us to see first-hand how it is carried out and how they create a variety of environments to be able to conserve plants from all around the world. Our student's particularly enjoyed visiting the hot houses, the carnivorous plants section, the tree top walk and the Hive.






























Year 7 Science Club

Science club started in October for our budding young scientists. Students have been able to cover lots of exciting topics and enjoyed lots of fun practical work. We kicked off science club making crystal gardens with Miss Jones. Students were given the brief – You are an ancient Roman science-artist living in the town of Herculaneum. Whilst walking by the docks, you notice that there are salt crystals growing on the hull of a few of the boats. Not only this, but the crystals vary in size and on a particularly dirty boat, there are crystals of different colours.

Like all good science-artists, you decide to investigate further...' Students had to mix together silicate solution and add crystals of their chosen metal salts. When then left the metal salts seem to act like seeds and grow long shoots creating their beautiful gardens made out of crystals.

Mr Ellís then showed the students how to díssect a rat and taught the students the anatomy of mammals.

Some students thought this was a bit disgusting!!

Mr Roche taught the students all about static electricity and used a Van Der Graaf generator to make the students hair stand on end and even give a few a shock!!

I introduced the students to the world of forensic science and how we can use science to solve crimes. A murder had been committed and students needed to identify who had committed the crime. They used different techniques to collect fingerprint and footprints and work out that the murderer was Mr Deare!

Mr Hess made glass with students and Mr Roche finished off the rotation by making rockets and setting them off on the school field, unfortunately he was a little too enthusiastic and the rocket ended up on the science department roof. A big thank you to our site staff for saving the day and recovering the rocket. We look forward to welcoming our next rotation of scientists and hopefully inspiring them to be the scientists of the future.

Practical work in science

After a very difficult few years, with covid restrictions limiting the amount of practical work in science, we are overjoyed to return to our normal practices using practical work to enhance our curriculum and engage and inspire our students.

Not only does practical work improve understanding of theory through practical experience, teach the principles of scientific inquiry and teach specific practical skills such as measurement and observation, that may be useful in future study or employment but it is proven to develop higher level skills and attributes such as communication, teamwork and perseverance. Practical skills contribute to 15% of assessment in science GCSEs and students completing A levels science have to pass a practical skills unit to achieve their qualification.

We look forward to doing more exciting practical work with our students in the future!

School of Rock Theatre Trip






Advent Calendar
