Evangeline H, Ella H, Charlotte G, Max B, Sophie W, Rebecca C, Shayna F, Jack S, Megan C and Lacey D.


Abbie G (Year 8) and Eloise E (Year 7) have also achieved this!

Birmingham science museum

During the last term of year 7, the whole year group went on a STEM trip to the Think Tank in Birmingham! The first thing we saw was an interesting lecture on the science behind sport where we talked about how sumo wrestlers need good balance to stay on the ground longer. There were lots of opportunities to volunteer and take centre stage which many of the year group did! The second lecture was about our universe where we used maths to try to understand the distances between the planets. We also had independent time where we were able to explore the many levels of the museum including the chance to programme a robot and look at some of the biology behind our bodies!


# Book Club






This year to mark Empathy Day, students thought about which books to boost empathy they would give to the people who make decisions in their lives. These are just a few of their recommendations.




Recommended to the Prime Minister because "he needs more empathy for refugee children".




Recommended to teachers because "it has good representation of LGBT+ people".

Recommended to heads of year "to help them understand teenagers who want to build confidence".




Recommended to parents because "it talks about self-identity and body image, it will help them understand their teens better".



# Y7 Stratford Tudor World Trip

The English Department were delighted to offer Year 7 the opportunity to visit Stratford Upon Avon and take part in a walking tour led by Shakespeare himself! We had the most wonderful weather, and Mr Deare and the other staff on the trip could not have been prouder of the courtesy, engagement and behaviour of all of the students who attended. It was fabulous to be able to take 78 students to Stratford, having just completed study of *The Tempest* in Y7.



This will help students to embed their knowledge of Jacobean and Elizabethan culture, links to the work they have recently completed in history lessons on the Tudors, and will help to prepare them for study of *Romeo and Juliet* in Y8, and *Macbeth* for GCSE. It was lovely to be joined by Miss Finlayson, Mr Deare, Miss Osbourne, Ms Robertson, Dr Burrells and, especially, Miss Smith, whose incredible organisational skills made the whole trip possible.

On our walking tour of Stratford we learnt about the history and importance of The Royal Shakespeare Company, as well as learning contextual details about Stratford in the Tudor and Stuart periods, the importance of Shakespeare's family to the town, and the anecdotes and historical details that inspired some of the most famous moments in his plays, including the ending of *Romeo and Juliet*, a spooky story which was accompanied by an eerie breeze as we heard it in the churchyard Shakespeare attended, and the significance of the plague to Shakespeare's life.





We began our walking tour at Shakespeare's childhood home, considering the origins and connotations of the Shakespeare family's coat of arms: a long pen styled like a spear. We visited Shakespeare's 'New House' which he built to show his status, and the school which he attended from 6am to 6pm every day except Sunday as a boy.

We finished our tour discussing some of Shakespeare's key plays and their impact on the steps of the Royal Shakespeare Company, before heading to the Tudor World museum to smell the plague, see the costumes, and learn a little about Tudor life. Students were thrilled to write their names with ink and quill pens! Finally, we had a go at acting some of the Bard's works, analysing Shakespeare's insults and complements, and acting out some scenes from Romeo and Juliet, as well as being coached in a Pike Drill and swordplay. We had such a great time that we hope to take our next year 7 on the same trip next year!



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
