Equality, Diversity & Inclusion statement

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Introductory notes

Since the Equality Act 2010 came into effect in April 2011 there has no longer been a requirement that schools should draw up and publish equality schemes or policies. It is still good practice, however, for a school to make a statement about the principles according to which it reviews the impact on equalities of its policies and practices, and according to which it gathers and publishes information, and decides on specific objectives.

Legal framework

1. We welcome our duties under the Equality Act 2010 to eliminate discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations in relation to age (as appropriate), disability, race, gender reassignment (maternity and pregnancy), religion and belief, sex and sexual orientation.

2. We welcome our duty under the Education and Inspections Act 2006 to promote community cohesion.

3. We recognise that these duties reflect international human rights standards as expressed in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, the UN Convention on the Rights of People with Disabilities, and the Human Rights Act 1998.

Guiding principles

4. In fulfilling the legal obligations cited above, we are guided by nine principles:

Principle 1: All learners are of equal value.

We see all learners and potential learners, and their parents and carers, as of equal value:

- whether or not they are disabled
- whatever their race, culture, national origin or national status
- whatever their sex and gender identity
- Whatever their religious or non-religious affiliation or faith background
- Whatever their sexual orientation.

Principle 2: We recognise and respect difference.

Treating people equally (Principle 1 above) does not necessarily involve treating them all the same. Our policies, procedures and activities must not discriminate but must nevertheless take account of differences of life-experience, outlook and background, and in the kinds of barrier and disadvantage which people may face, in relation to:

- disability, so that reasonable adjustments are made
- race, so that different cultural backgrounds and experiences of prejudice are recognised
- sex, so that the different needs and experiences of all persons are recognised
- religion, belief or faith background
- sexual orientation.

Principle 3: We foster positive attitudes and relationships, and a shared sense of cohesion and belonging.

We intend that our policies, procedures and activities should promote:

• equally inclusive and positive attitudes towards people with health conditions or impairments', positive relations between all individuals regardless of health or disability status, and an absence of harassment of disabled people.

• positive interaction, good relations and dialogue between groups and communities different from each other in terms of ethnicity, culture, religious affiliation, national origin or national status, and an absence of prejudice-related bullying and incidents

• mutual respect and good relations between all persons, and an absence of sexual and homophobic harassment.

Principle 4: We observe good equalities practice in staff recruitment, retention and development.

We ensure that policies and procedures should benefit all employees and potential employees, for example in recruitment and promotion, and in continuing professional development:

- whether or not they are a disabled person.
- whatever their race, culture, religious affiliation, national origin or national status
- whatever their sex and sexual orientation
- with full respect for legal rights relating to pregnancy, maternity, paternity, adoption and parental leave

Principle 5: We aim to reduce and remove inequalities and barriers that already exist

In addition to avoiding or minimizing possible negative impacts of our policies, we take opportunities to maximise positive impacts by reducing and removing inequalities and barriers that may already exist between:

- disabled and non-disabled people
- people of different ethnic, cultural and religious backgrounds
- all persons regardless of their gender identity.

Principle 6: We consult and involve widely

We engage with a range of groups and individuals to ensure that those who are affected by a policy or activity are consulted and involved in the design of new policies, and in the review of existing ones. We consult and involve:

- disabled people as well as non-disabled
- people from a range of ethnic, cultural and religious backgrounds
- all persons regardless of their gender identity.
- everyone regardless of their sexual orientation.

Principle 7: Society as a whole should benefit

We intend that our policies and activities should benefit society as a whole, both locally and nationally, by fostering greater social cohesion, and greater participation in public life of:

- disabled people as well as non-disabled
- people of a wide range of ethnic, cultural and religious backgrounds
- all persons regardless of their gender identity.

• everyone regardless of their sexual orientation.

Principle 8: We base our practices on sound evidence

We commit to regularly reviewing with Governance, Leadership and Stakeholders our successes and developmental priorities in the promotion of diversity and inclusivity as an organisation.

Principle 9: Objectives

We formulate specific and measurable organisational objectives, based on the evidence we have collected, published data (principle 8) and the engagement in which we have been involved (principle 7).

The objectives which we identify take into account national and local priorities and issues, as appropriate.

We keep our equality objectives under review and report annually on progress towards achieving them. We update our equality objectives every four years.

The curriculum

We keep each curriculum subject or area under review in order to ensure that teaching and learning reflect the principles set out in paragraph 4 above.

Ethos and organisation

We ensure the principles listed in paragraph 4 above apply to the full range of our policies and practices, including those that are concerned with:

- pupils' progress, attainment and achievement
- pupils' personal development, welfare and well-being
- teaching methods
- admissions and attendance
- staff recruitment, retention and professional development
- care, guidance and support
- behaviour, discipline and exclusions
- working in partnership with parents, carers and guardians
- working with the wider community.

Addressing prejudice and prejudice-related bullying

The school is opposed to all forms of prejudice which stand in the way of fulfilling the legal duties referred to in paragraphs 1–3:

• prejudices around disability and additional educational needs

• prejudices around racism and xenophobia, including those that are directed towards religious groups and communities, for example anti-Semitism and Islamophobia, and those that are directed against Travellers, migrants, refugees and people seeking asylum.

• prejudices directed towards sexual discrimination, including any discrimination directed towards sexual identity or orientation, biphobia, transphobia or homophobia.

There is a school procedure on how prejudice-related incidents should be identified, assessed, recorded and dealt with. The school shall keep a record of prejudice-related incidents and, if requested, provide a report to

the local authority or HMI about the numbers, types and seriousness of prejudice-related incidents at our school and how they are dealt with.

Roles and responsibilities

The Governing Body is responsible for ensuring that the school complies with legislation, and that this statement and its related procedures and action plans are implemented.

A member of the Governing Body has a watching brief regarding the implementation of this statement.

The Headteacher is responsible for implementing the policy; for ensuring that all staff are aware of their responsibilities and are given appropriate training and support; and for taking appropriate action in any cases of unlawful discrimination.

The headteacher will ensure or distribute day-to-day responsibility for co-ordinating implementation of the statement.

All staff are expected to:

- promote an inclusive and collaborative ethos in their classroom
- deal with any prejudice-related incidents that may occur

• plan and deliver curricula and lessons that reflect the principles in paragraph 4 above o support pupils in their class for whom English is an additional language

• keep up-to-date with equalities legislation relevant to their work.

Information and resources

We ensure that the content of this statement is known to all staff and governors and, as appropriate, to all pupils and their parents and carers. All staff and governors have access to a selection of resources which discuss and explain concepts of equality, diversity and community cohesion in appropriate detail.

Religious observance

We respect the religious beliefs and practice of all staff, pupils and parents, and comply with reasonable requests relating to religious observance and practice.

Staff development and training

We ensure that all staff, including support and administrative staff, receive appropriate training and opportunities for professional development, both as individuals and as groups or teams.

Breaches of the policy

Breaches of this statement will be dealt with in the same ways that breaches of other school policies are dealt with, as determined by the Head teacher and governing body.

Monitoring and review

We collect, study and use quantitative and qualitative data relating to the implementation of this statement, and make adjustments as appropriate. In particular we collect, analyse and use data in relation to achievement, broken down as appropriate according to disabilities and special educational needs; ethnicity, culture, language, national origin and national status; and sex.
